What's Cookin?

I am always looking for new recipes to share with you in the monthly Herald. With the New Year, here are just a few foods to eat for GOOD LUCK as per Readers Digest.



<u>COLLARD GREENS</u> Collard Greens are a late crop mostly grown in the South, so they're easy to find in the colder months. Supposedly greens are a go-to New Year's Day food because they resemble money.

2 lbs. Collard Greens 3 strips Bacon, chopped 1 small Red Onion, chopped 2 cloves Garlic, minced 2^{1/2} cups Water 1 Tbsp. Cider Vinegar

3/4 tsp. Salt 1/2 tsp. Pepper 1 can (15 oz) Pinto Beans, rinsed and drained

Remove and discard center ribs and stems from Collard Greens. Cut leaves into 1-inch pieces. In a Dutch oven, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp. Stirring occasionally. Add onion and garlic to bacon and drippings; cook and stir 2 minutes. Add collard greens; cook and stir until they begin to wilt. Stir in water, brown sugar, vinegar, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, 55-65 minutes or until greens are tender, adding beans during the last 15 minutes.



CORNBREAD Mix and match traditional New Year's food—fill your plate with black-eyed peas, greens and cornbread—to hopefully make a fortune this year. As the Southern saying goes, "Peas for pennies, greens for dollars and cornbread for gold"

2/3 cup Butter, softened 3 large Eggs, room temp. $2^{1/3}$ cups All-Purpose Flour

1 cup Cornmeal 4 1/2 tsp. Baking powder 1 tsp. Salt

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Combine eggs and milk. Combine flour, cornmeal, baking powder and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with egg mixture. Pour into greased 13 x 9 inch baking pan. Bake for 22-27 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in center comes our clean. Cut into squares; serve warm.



ROASTED GRAPES & SWEET CHEESE PHYLLO GALETTE Make sure to add grapes to your New Year's food and cheese platter this year. On New Year's Eve, Spaniards eat a grape for each stroke of midnight, with each representing a page of the calendar ahead. If one grape is bitter, watch out for that month!

1- 8oz pkg. Cream Cheese, softened 2 Tbsp. Orange Marmalade 1 tsp. Sugar

8 sheets Phyllo Dough (14x9-inch) 4 Tbsp. Butter, melted 1 cup Seedless Grapes

1 Tbsp. Honey 2 tsp. Coarse Sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese, marmalade and sugar until smooth; set aside. Place 1 sheet of phyllo on a parchment-lined baking sheet; brush with butter. Layer with remaining phyllo sheets, brushing each layer. (Keep remaining phyllo covered with a damp towel to prevent it from drying out.) Spread cream cheese mixture over phyllo to within 2 in. of edges. Arrange grapes over cream cheese. Fold edges of phyllo over filling, leaving center uncovered. Brush folded phyllo with any remaining butter; drizzle with honey and sprinkle with coarse sugar. Bake until phyllo is golden brown, 35-40 minutes. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Refrigerate leftovers.



RING-SHAPED CAKE Ring-shaped cakes—sometimes with trinkets baked inside—are a symbol of coming full circle, making them a traditional New Year's food. This practice stems from the Greeks, who make a traditional vasilopita for New Year's Eve with a hidden coin baked inside. If you get the piece with the coin, you'll have good luck for a year.

1 cup packed Brown Sugar 1 cup hot brewed Coffee 1 cup Canola Oil 1 cup Light Molasses

1/4 cup Sour Cream2 large Eggs, room temp. $3^{1/4}$ cups All-Purpose Flour5 tsp. ground Ginger $2^{1/2}$ tsp. Baking Soda $1^{1/2}$ tsp. ground Cinnamon1 tsp. Salt1 cup chopped Walnuts, toasted

1/4 cup chopped Crystallized Ginger (save some for top decoration)

Glaze: 2 cups Confectioners' Sugar 2 tsp. Lemon Zest 3 to 4 Tbsp. Lemon Juice

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour a 10-in. fluted tube pan. In a large bowl, beat brown sugar, coffee, oil, molasses and sour cream. Add eggs; beat until well blended. In another bowl, whisk flour, ground ginger, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; gradually beat into molasses mixture. Stir in walnuts and crystallized ginger. Transfer batter to prepared pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 40-50 minutes. Cool in pan 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.

For glaze, in a small bowl, mix confectioners' sugar, lemon zest and enough lemon juice to reach a drizzling consistency. Drizzle over cake; sprinkle with additional crystallized ginger.



Happy New Year from the staff at the Early Learning Center! We're excited to kick off January with a lot of exciting things in store... not only for this month, but for the rest of the year! We are looking forward to a happy, healthy, and prosperous New Year!

Last month the children focused on Christmas, Hannukah, and Kwanza. The children had so much fun making holiday projects. They enjoyed their classroom Christmas party, singing Christmas songs in Fellowship Hall for family and friends, and their visit from Santa. Thank you to all of the parents who contributed to our classroom parties!

This was the first year we had a Christmas tree in our hallway that was decorated with Christmas cards from our students, teachers, and friends. It looked beautiful so will we do it again next year.



This month we will be focusing on winter, hibernation, and Martin Luther King Jr. The children will be observing the weather outside and how the temperature has been changing. We will be exploring winter weather and all the fun things to do during this season, such as, playing in the snow and making snowmen. We will also discuss how we dress in the winter. There will be snowman and snowflake art using a wide variety of materials. The students will have the opportunity to use their imagination to create anything they'd like using marshmallows. For Martin Luther King Jr. Day the children will do a special project and the teachers will read a story about Martin Luther King Jr. They will learn about his accomplishments and his dream. We will talk about cooperation, acceptance, peace and caring for all people. At the end of the month student progress reports will go home and parents will have an opportunity to sign up for a teacher conference.

The hallway in the education wing is now decorated for winter with hats, mittens, and ice skates that the children have made with the help of their teacher's.

Happy New Year! During the month of December, our villagers enjoyed using their five senses to explore the holiday season. Every sense was utilized as we investigated smells, tastes, and sounds of this sensory heightened season.

Investigating was a key science standard this month as our villagers' manipulated materials and commented on the impact of their own actions. We explored the Evergreen tree through smell and touch, built our own Christmas trees with various materials, created ornament process art by investigating the different effects of rolling different sized ornaments in paint and creating imprints of textured ornaments in Play-Doh. This week ended with a focus on another delicious treat, candy canes. We continued to utilize our investigation skills as we created fizzy candy canes and dissolved candy canes in different temperatures of minted scented water.

During the second week of December, we continued using our senses to explore key holiday figures and famous holiday tunes including Rudolph, Frosty, Santa, Santa's Elves and even The Grinch. We spent a great deal of this week working on shapes as we matched familiar shapes with the same size and orientation and identified two-dimensional shapes in different orientations and sizes. Our villagers-built Rudolph and Frosty, created special reindeer food, created Grinch ornaments, turned themselves into elf ornaments, engaged in various sensory bins depicting the theme of the day, and even had a quick visit with Santa himself. Our villagers also utilized their sense of hearing as we used our Alexa to play various renditions of each of these Christmas classics.

The third week of December brought us to explore various cultural winter holidays throughout the world celebrated by some members of our village community. This was such a special week at our village as both children and staff learned about the different traditions and customs of our peers and staff. We began by learning about Saint Nicholas Day. During this Italian celebration, children receive stockings filled with goodies. Our villagers used their fine motor skills to sew stockings and create stockings for the animals of a nonprofit organization named Puppy Kitty NYC. We next investigated Diwali, the Indian Celebration of Lights. We were lucky to have Mrs. Champagne, one of our village moms, come in to share the traditions of this holiday with us. She instructed our villagers how to create **Rangoli**. Rangoli is the creation of shapes using special colored salt. We learned the importance of siblings' relationships during this holiday, so we also used pictures of our own siblings to build magnetic representations of them. <u>**Three Kings Day**</u> was the next winter holiday we encountered. Mrs. Delgado, another villager mom came in and shared a Three King's Day craft, made Arroz Con Dulce to share, and read a story to our older toddler room. We learned that **Hanukah** is the festival of lights. We loved manipulating the spinning **Dreidel** and building our **Menorah** by placing candles in and out. We ended this week by learning about **Kwanzaa**. Our villagers learned that corn is an important symbol of this holiday. So, we created **Mahindi**, or Corn paintings, and the **Mkea** placemat by using shapes to create patterns. It was a wonderful week learning about all the cultures and traditions that make up our village community.























The final week of December was our annual Polar Express week. Throughout this week our entire school community came in each day in our holiday jammies as we continued our work exploring the Christmas season using our five senses and our scientific investigation skills as we took on the roles of little engineers. We built tracks and watched and listened to trains on the go. The highlight of this week was our visit from Santa and our Christmas sing-along. Throughout the week we created our Christmas family gifts. This year we measured each child and created a wooden snowman measured to each child's height for families to enjoy throughout the years.

We're excited to blast off into 2024 with our village community as we dive into welcoming winter. This month we will expand upon the investigation work we did in December using our five senses. We start this month by focusing on key symbols of the winter season including winter weather and proper winter attire.

The next two weeks of January will lead us to learning about Arctic animals. We will spend one week studying Arctic land animals such as Polar Bears, The Arctic Wolf, Snowy Owls, Arctic Hares and Caribou. We will continue to use our senses to discover how these specific animals communicate, the way their fur looks and feels, and how they survive in their Arctic habitat. Next, we will move to Artic animals of the seas. Throughout this week, we will discover Artic Sea animals such as Beluga Whales, Penguins, Narwhals, Walrus', and Harp Seals. After spending two weeks on different Arctic Animals, we will begin to learn about animals who aren't able to adapt to live in very cold temperatures so they must hibernate or migrate.

We are excited to begin 2024 with our village family and community and wish all of you a Happy and Healthy New Year.
