Poor Mans Lobster Submitted by Helen Wendt for publication in the Old Stone Church Cookbook

Bass Fillet (2"x3") Lemon Juice

Cocktail Sauce Crackers

Steam a small piece of fillet until the meat is white and flaky. Brake apart with a fork. Chill in freezer for 15—20 minutes. Mix with cocktail sauce and lemon. Serve on a cracker.



Beet and Apple Salad Submitted by Virginia Liebler for publication in the Old Stone Church Cookbook

1 can (2 cups) sliced Beets, drained 1/4 cup water

1 Apple, peeled and diced in 1/2" pieces 1/4 cup Sugar

1/2 medium Onion, sliced thin 1/2 tsp. Salt

1/2 cup Vinegar 1 tsp. Caraway Seeds

2 tsp. Horseradish

Place beets, apple and onions in a jar. Boil vinegar, water, sugar and salt for 3 minutes. Add caraway seeds and horseradish. Pour sauce over beets and apples. Cover and refrigerate for 12 hours, stirring several times.

Green Bean, Red Onion & Tomato Salad

Submitted by Kathy LaPia for publication in the Old Stone Church Cookbook

10 oz. Fresh Green Beans (trimmed) 1 tsp dried Basil

1 small Red Onion (thinly sliced) 2 Tbsp fresh Parsley (chopped)

3 Plum Tomatoes (sliced in small wedges) 1/4 tsp Salt

2 cloves Garlic (minced) 1/4 tsp Pepper

2 Tbsp Balsamic Vinegar 1/2 cup Canola or Olive Oil

Blanch the green beans and rinse under cold water and drain. In a large serving bowl, combine the beans with the onion and tomatoes. In a small mixing bowl, whisk the garlic, basil, parsley, salt, pepper, vinegar and oil until combined. Pour over vegetables and toss to coat. Marinate for at least one hour or up to overnight.

2 small pkgs Lime Jello (8 oz) 1 #2 can crushed Pineapple (drained)

1—16 oz Large Curd Cottage Cheese


Global Outreach...

Old Stone Village July Herald

June came and went so quickly at Old Stone Village, but they say, 'time flies when you're having fun!'. We started off the month visiting the aquarium visiting warm water friends. We explored Tropical fish, sharks, dolphins, jellyfish and stingrays. We explored the various species through many different sensory bins inside and outside in our water tables. We helped the fish swim, wound up the swimming dolphins, stacked jellyfish with their suction cup tentacles, and fed the hungry sharks with tiny fish. We worked on more and less while counting fish in fishbowls, counted which dolphin mom had more babies, and which creature we had more of in our sticker aquariums. Our favorite activity of the week was most likely sifting through our new sand table for various shark teeth and other marine treasures.







The second week of the month we traveled to the icy cold waters on our aquarium trip to meet our cold-water friends. We helped penguins hop from iceberg to iceberg in our arctic water sensory bin and added cotton balls to our penguin pictures. We weighed different whales on our scale to see who weighed more than their whale friends and then helped them navigate the icy channels in our iceberg water run. We also used straws to blow paint on the top of our whale pictures to depict the water coming out of their blowholes. Wednesday brought us to the docks as we sank our lobster traps to see which class could catch more lobsters. We ended the week exploring narwhals by making different playdoh Narwhal creations and coloring our own narwhal tusk headbands.









The Third week of June brought us out of the Aquarium and onto the beach. We explored sand, seashells and shellfish, and various sand and water sports. We had a full water day under our palm tree sprinklers and loved getting back to full water play. We built sandcastles out of kinetic sand inside and mixed water into our dry sand table outside to make larger castles outdoors too. We decorated frisbees and then learned how to make them fly really far! Our Villagers ended their week by racing boats in our water tables around all the sharp turns. We had a beachball-apalooza to end our week where we filled the playground with countless beachballs, painted beach balls and used water squirters to move them across the playground.





We concluded the month of June at the campground. We made our own smores trail mix where we scooped and measured scoops of various ingredients. Then we painted with different sized marshmallows to make beautiful pictures. Our Villagers took turns in our tent pretending to cook on our campfire with the pretend food. We roasted hotdogs and marshmallows for our camp dinner over the light-up campfire. Our younger toddlers painted the nighttime sky with glitter stars while the older toddlers painted with glow paint. We made our own binoculars to search through the glow in the dark star bin.







On June 17th we dedicated our Lending Library outside our Garden in loving memory of Marissa Harris, a beautiful friend and coworker who passed away suddenly in August of last year from Sickle Cell Anemia. June 19th was officially designated as "World Sickle Cell Awareness Day" and in honor of Marissa we all wore red last year to show her our support. This year, again, we all wore red to honor her strength and courage through the battle that ultimately took her from us. Our oldest villagers each picked out their favorite books to place inside our lending library and we had two of our past Villagers, Santino Ferrigno and Wesley Sartor, place Marissa's favorite children's book "Green Eggs and Ham" into our Library to kick off the ceremony. Marissa's mother, brother and nephew also joined us for this dedication ceremony and continue to be a part of our Village family.

July will kick off our "Modes of transportation" units as we explore various locations throughout the world we could travel to in different ways. Our first week we will start local as we visit NYC and other local attractions by train and car. We will explore the Statue of Liberty and celebrate the4th of July with a day of Flag projects and other national symbols. Our second week will bring us onto an airplane to travel to Florida and visit Disney World. This is a fan favorite of our Villagers as they love going through the park and getting to explore with their favorite characters throughout this week. Our third week will bring us by boat to the Caribbean as we learn all about island life and hopefully get to spend much of this week outside in the water. We will of course end the week with a traditional Hawaiian Luau! The final week of the month will bring us aboard the space shuttle and travel through the stars and different planets. We love learning all about outer space and spaceships.

This Summer will go quickly as we will soon be saying goodbye to another 18 Villagers as they move on to preschool. This class of Villagers is made up of our original infant class so seeing our "first babies" move onto preschool is a bittersweet time for us here at OSV. Our graduation will be held on August 26th outside in our playground area.

We'd like to thank everyone who voted for us in the 2022 Best of the Shoreline for daycare centers. We recently received correspondence that we are one of the top three finalists for this category, and are eagerly awaiting to see what place we came in this year. Winners will be released in September.
