

A teacher gave her class of second graders a lesson on the magnet and what it does. The next day in a written test, she included this question: "My full name has six letters. The first one is M. I pick up things. What am I?" When the test papers were turned in, the teacher was astonished to find that almost 50 percent of the students answered the question with the word Mother.

While many of us may get a chuckle out of this little story, we must also agree that there is a powerful truth being shared here as well. What's Cookin'?

Bacon and Water Chestnuts submitted for publishing in the OSC Cookbook by Audrey Pochodowicz

1 1/2 lb Bacon 2 small cans Whole Water Chestnuts **Tooth Picks**

SAUCE: 1 cup Sugar 1 cup Ketchup

Pre-cook bacon until soft. Roll one half of a bacon strip around one water chestnut. Fasten with a toothpick. Continue with the rest of the water chestnuts and bacon. Mix sugar and ketchup together. Place bacon wraps in glass dish. Pour sugar and ketchup mixture over them. Bake at 350 degrees uncovered for 30 minutes





Zucchini Casserole submitted for publishing in the OSC Cookbook by Carole Landers

2 small Zucchini (sliced) 1 stick Butter (melted) 1 - 16oz. Can Stewed Tomatoes 1/2 cup Onions (diced)

■ 3/4 cup Breadcrumbs Shredded Parmesan and Cheddar Cheese

Put sliced zucchini in casserole dish, add onions and stewed tomatoes. Cook at 350 degrees for 20 minutes until soft. Take out of oven. Combine breadcrumbs and melted butter. Put on top of zucchini. Add Parmesan cheese to cover and then Cheddar cheese. Cook 10 more minutes to melt cheeses.

2 cups Light Brown Sugar 1 tsp. Baking Soda

1/2 tsp. Salt 1 cup Oil

1 cup warm Coffee 2 Eggs

3 cups Flour 1 tsp. Vanilla



Combine ingredients. Put in a 9" x 13" pan. Sprinkle 1/2 cup nuts and 8 oz pkg of butterscotch bits on top. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes. Cut into squares after the cake has cooled.

14-16 Jumbo Shrimp 1 stick Margarine or Butter 1/3 cup Cooking Sherry 1/2—2/3 cup Half & Half 1 tsp. Minced Garlic Italian Bread Crumbs

Melt butter, add garlic and sherry. Simmer for a few seconds. Add shrimp and cook a few minutes until done. Shut off heat. Add cream and bread crumbs. Stir & mix.

Hamburger Soup submitted for publishing in the OSC Cookbook by Marion Burkard

1 lb Hamburg or Ground Turkey 1/4 cup Barley 1 small Onion (chopped) 1/2 cup Orzo Pasta 1 large can Chicken Broth 1/2 cup frozen Peas 1—16 oz. can Diced Tomatoes 1/2 cup frozen Corn

2 Carrots (chopped) 1 bunch Parsley (chopped)

2 stalks Celery (chopped) Salt & Pepper

1/2 cup Turnip (diced)

Brown chopped meat, add onions and celery, cook 'til soft. Add tomatoes, chicken broth, carrots, turnip, barley and orzo. Let simmer 'til tender. Add frozen vegetables. (Cook for approx. 15 minutes and serve hot)



THE BOUNTY OF FARMERS MARKETS

Exerpt from article published in Natural Awakenings 2022 Natural Living Directory by Sandra Yayati

Throughout the nation, an estimated 8,000 farmers markets offer some of the freshest food available anywhere. Often open on weekend mornings or select weeknights, these nutritional meccas allow local farmers to sell their fruits, vegetables, eggs, meat and dairy directly to consumers, thereby providing an attractive business channel for them. "If you buy direct from a farmer, 97 cents of every dollar goes home with the farmer, whereas if you buy from a traditional grocery store, only 17 cents makes its way back to the farmer," says Janie Maxwell, executive director of the Illinois Farmers Market Association. Dollars spent at farmers markets boost local economies. "When farmers male money, they buy seeds at their local co-op or purchase tools from a nearby hardware store, which infuses economic capita; into rural communities." says Katie Myhre, technology research manager at the Farmers Market Coalition. "If we can focus on growing the capacity of our farms within our region and building consumer habits around what we can grow locally, that's going to help our region become more resilient."

This type of localized commerce offers environmental benefits too. Produce from a local source carries a much smaller carbon footprint than one that travelled halfway across the country. "Farmers markets are uniquely positioned to encourage environmentally responsible farming by providing a solid economic platform to climate-positive farmers that are taking care of land and water quality," Myhre asserts.

"The wonderful thing about farmers market is that it leads with joy." Myhre says. "It's fun. You don't invite friends to the grocery store, but you might meet your friends for coffee at the farmers market"


