



Stuffed Mushrooms Submitted by Patricia Johnson for publication in the OSC Cookbook

1 Small can Deviled Ham 1 Tbsp. Butter 1/4 to 1/2 Cup Seasoned Bread Crumbs

Worcestershire Sauce to taste 1 Tbsp. Chopped Onion

1—12 oz Pkg. Whole Mushrooms

African Peanut Soup Submitted by Peggy Thomas for publication in the OSC Cookbook

1 Medium Onion, chopped
 3 Tbsp Butter
 1/8 cup Natural Peanut Butter
 Freshly Ground Black Pepper

Pinch of Salt 1/8 cup Cooked Orzo

1/8—1/2 tsp. Cayenne 1/8 cup very small pieces Cooked Chicken

1 very large Sweet Potato, (chopped into small pieces) Chicken Broth



When I make soup, the measurements are not very exact, so play with what you think tastes good. I wrote down approximate amounts. This is not a science. Serves about six people. Saute' onion in butter until clear; use pinch of salt here. Add cayenne and cook a few minutes. Add sweet potato and broth (to cover). Simmer until the sweet potatoes are very soft. Add peanut butter and black pepper. Place all into blender and blend until smooth. Return to pan. Adjust seasoning. Add orzo and chicken. Add more broth or skim milk to thin out or use cream for a creamed soup.

Fall is an amazing time here at Old Stone Village with October being the heart of the season. Our monthly standards have changed and throughout this month we built upon skills we began in September with a new focus on identification of shapes, energy, force and motion, and regulating emotions and behaviors. We kicked off the month celebrating Community Helpers, amazing people in our community those who help keep us safe and healthy. The second week of the month we celebrated Fire Prevention Week at OSV with a plethora of fire activities and safety lessons. The third week of the month we spent focusing on Pumpkins and gourds through opposites and finished the month out with a dive into the symbols of Halloween.


The first week of October our Villagers turning into little dentists as they practiced brushing, flossing, and counting their teeth. We flossed playdoh out of our toy teeth, painted with toothbrushes and used mirrors to check out our very own teeth. Day two brought us into a Veterinary clinic where we tended to our various stuffed animal

friends and made them feel better. We matched our animal friends to their respective homes, cleaned them up in the bathtub, gave them their medicine and checked their heartbeats with their stethoscopes. The next day we had our Nurse Consultant come visit us and show us the various tools that Doctors, and Nurses use every day to keep us healthy. We practiced filling play syringes with liquid, put Band-Aids on our teddy bears and created our own medical bags

by putting colorful tools into our paper doctors' kits. The fourth day we learned about mechanics and how they help us by keeping our cars safe while we drive. Our Villagers used various tools on our toy cars to "fix" them, washed cars in our

carwash, we even made sure they were agile around the twists and turns of various shapes as we drove the different courses. We wrapped up our week by exploring Police Officers and everything

they do for us by racing to save our friends, and even having our fingerprints taken. The Officer Ryan Michalowski from the East Haven with our Villagers. He showed us his radio, Our Villagers loved sitting in the driver's seat of tools he has at his disposal to help people in need, we were heroes too.

The second week, we celebrated Nation Fire Prevention Week at Old Stone Village. This is a week we look forward to every year, but this year was especially exciting because of the group of Villagers we have and their ongoing obsession with Firefighters and Fire Trucks. We spent time each day exploring different branches of a fire rescue team, we learned how to save people by air, by land, and by sea. We raced cars to fires and used fire extinguisher shaped water squirters to put out our pretend fires outside on different shaped buildings with our firefighter friends. Our infants built campfires and roasted marshmallows over it while making

sure to keep our water and fire extinguishers close and raced a fire boat to save people in trouble on the water. We made art to represent our favorite parts of fire safety – footprint dalmatians, shape firetrucks, different color fire rescue planes, and squish painting fire. East Haven Fire Department came to visit with their firetrucks and show us his gear up close and sit in the passenger seat of a firetruck.

Week three brought us to explore pumpkins and gourds through opposites. Each year we bring an OSV size pumpkin patch right to our Villagers where we allow each villager the ability to explore and select their own perfect pumpkin. Our villagers wash their pumpkins to make sure they're show ready before they decorate them with paints and stickers. We opened the pumpkins and let our friends explore the seeds and innards of pumpkins of different sizes. We made art representing the insides of pumpkins with strings of yarn, and the outsides represented by smooth tissue paper. We had an entire day dedicated to pumpkin games where we bowled, had pumpkin sack races, tossed baby pumpkins into the jack-o-lanterns mouths, pumpkin roll races, and watched jack-

o-lantern faces explode with pumpkin volcanos. We love pumpkin week mainly because we make them into Jack-o -lanterns and leads us into Halloween week! The last week of the month we spend celebrating every aspect of Halloween with our Villagers. We explored bats and cats through sensory experiences as we dug through webs to catch all the spiders and then crawled around our classrooms as spooky black cats. We explored spooky things that walk such as mummies, skeletons, and monsters

Our Villagers used skeleton hands to dig through colored spaghetti to find monster eyes, fingerpainted monsters and put giant google eyes on them. We sorted bones, candy, ghosts, and Haunted Houses by size and shape in all classrooms with activities differentiated by age and abilities. Each of our classrooms created art projects reflecting the various theme of the day in anticipation of the Halloween holiday.

We ended the last day of October with one of our favorite events we have all year here at Old Stone Village. Our annual Halloween parade down Main Street with our Villagers, their families, and the Early Learning Center. The Early Learning Center began this tradition years ago and as soon as we opened Old Stone Village Childcare, we joined in on the fun immediately. Our Villagers and their families dress in costumes as we walk to the neighboring businesses on Main Street in East Haven and "trick or treat". The neighboring businesses look forward to this event just as much as all our families do, this year was no different. We cannot thank all the businesses that participate, enough for making this event so memorable for all of the children of the Early Learning Center and Old Stone Village Childcare.

We cannot begin to express how truly thankful we are after all the support we received at our First Annual Trunk or Treat held in the Old Stone Church parking lot on October 15th.We had 23 Disney themed cars participate and sold

93 tickets to children of Old Stone Village, The Early Learning Center and even friends non-related to Old Stone Church.

Everyone in attendance had an amazing time trick or treating with our spectacularly decorated Disney cars, dancing to music with friends, snacking at our Concession booth and picking out which buckets from our

Raffle to put their tickets in. We had prizes donated for our raffle by Libero
Jewelers, Brandfon Honda & Brandfon Hyundai, Aniello's Italian Restaurant, LoMonaco's Restaurant, The Sandpiper, Rocco's Off Wooster, Jennifer's Ice Cream, Twin Pines Diner,

Our annual Butter Braid fundraiser began the third week of October and will continue through November 9th for Delivery the week of Thanksgiving. Every year we have done this fundraiser we have raised the most money out of any of our Fundraisers and we expect no different this year! November will bring us into our month of being Thankful. Our Villagers will spend time each week exploring the main things that we are thankful for. The first week will be exploring all the beautiful things that make us who we are, we are thankful to be exactly who we are! The second week we will be celebrating our many friendships through our "Thankful for our Friends" week. We will spend the week working together on various activities and talking about the many things we love about having special friends. The third week will be exploring how thankful we are for our families by incorporating our own families into our daily lessons. We will build family trees, use our dollhouse families to pick figures that represent their own families, and then compare the differences between each other's families. The week of Thanksgiving we will spend reviewing the different symbols of Thanksgiving and of course finishing our Holiday week with our annual Thanksgiving Feast with our Villagers and their families. This has been a favorite tradition of ours since we opened in 2019 and due to covid we were unable to invite our families in to enjoy it with us the last two years. This year we are over the moon to be able to share this experience with all our villagers in such a special way!
