2 cups Italian Breadcrumbs 1-6 oz can Black Olives

2–14 oz cans Artichoke Hearts 2–4 oz cans Mushrooms

2—16 oz cans Sliced White potatoes

2/3 cup Shortening, softened 1 tsp Lemon Extract

2/3 cup Sugar 5 1/2 cups Flour

2 Eggs 2 tsp Baking Soda

1 cup Honey 1 tsp Salt



Cream shortening and sugar, beat in eggs, honey and lemon extract. Stir in flour, baking soda, and salt. Shape into ball and chill for 2 hours. Roll and cut. Place on un-greased cookie sheet. Bake 375 degrees for about 10 minutes. FROSTING: 1 cup Confectionary sugar and 1 Tbsp. Water. Stir to combine. Dip cooled cookies or drizzle on top. ENJOY this sweet confection.





ceiling, the entire interior was redecorated and the old heating system was replaced. In 1958 the sanctuary was redecorated. The Restoration Committee chose deep red carpeting and red velvet pew cushions. The walls were painted antique ivory, the woodwork white.

Pictures shown are from 1900 as decorated for a Congregational Clubs Meeting, (as noted on the reverse of the photograph).

Did you know? In 1868 the inner walls and ceiling were painted in fresco and a new pulpit replaced the old one. The lower floor was re-carpeted, the pews were provided with new cushions and new kerosene oil lamps were installed in place of the previous whale oil lamps. In December 1933 just a day before Christmas Service was to be held, the plaster fell. It appeared the snow had seriously weakened the old lath and plaster in the ceiling. Following a thorough inspection, it was decided that among all the rebuilding of the roof and





NEWS FROM OUR VILLAGE OCTOBER EDITION

Change seems to be an ongoing theme in our village. However, our change has always been connected to growth. Throughout the month of September, we welcomed seventeen new villagers into our building. Over the month of October, we will welcome an additional six villagers into our family. Throughout September we placed a heavy emphasis on number names and one to one correspondence. We've noticed significant growth across our center in this area. We've also seen our curious children light up as they've explored characteristics of different plants and animals, such as sunflowers, apples, and farm animals through their senses. Their curiosity and eagerness across all content areas is inspirational. The acclimation of our new children was also aglow in September. We've witnessed our new younger toddlers begin to understand classroom culture and routines, our older toddlers fully adjust to their new classroom setting and our infants significantly increase their mobility and communication by signing.

We begin October by learning about fire safety and the job of these heroes. We are fortunate to have a community focused fire department and chief who values community outreach and education. Due to Covid restrictions we are unable to tour our East Haven fire trucks as we've done in the past, but Fire Marshall Miller is planning a special activity for our villagers in lieu of the traditional visit. We will continue learning about other significant community helpers during the second week of October. These helpers include both those who keep us healthy and those who keep us safe. Some key figures we will learn about will be our police officers, paramedics, doctors, nurses, and dentists.

The final two weeks of October are dedicated to our center's favorite holiday, Halloween. We will begin Halloween preparations by creating our very own pumpkin patch where our villagers will have the opportunity to pick their own pumpkin. Our villagers already began investigating pumpkins during our signs of fall theme, however, they will take their knowledge a step further by creating jack-o-lanterns. This unit provides the perfect opportunity to teach emotions through facial expressions. Throughout the month of October, we will also focus on shapes. Spookley the Square Pumpkin is a great book which begins to teach our children about acceptance through differences with an emphasis on shapes. October will come to a close with a week on Halloween Symbols. We enjoy focusing on symbols and signs in order to build our villagers schema about the outside world. Some Halloween symbols we will cover will be spiders, bats, ghosts, haunted houses, and holiday candy. Our villagers will also get the opportunity to dress in their costumes and parade around Main Street with children from The Early Learning Center. We were unable to carry on this tradition last year but we are excited to reinstate this tradition with enhanced Covid precautions such as wearing masks while outdoors and socially distancing classes.

October also marks the beginning of our annual fundraiser selling our Butter Braids. This is our key fundraiser and has helped us with curriculum supplies and outdoor toys for the past two years. If you are interested in purchasing any butter braids, please e-mail the school at oldstonevillage@gmail.com or reach out to Heidi in the main office.

We are always available for tours outside of school hours and have open enrollment throughout the year. We no longer have any full-time spots available but do have a couple part time spots remaining. We are also currently looking for some part time teachers to work afternoon hours. If you know anyone who would be an amazing addition to our village family, please send them our way. We post daily to our stories so the community can continue to feel connected to us despite Covid guidelines.




