Dear sisters and brothers of the Old Stone Church and beyond,

As you stroll through the local stores, you'll see an abundance of bunnies, baskets, and candy for sale, and those may be the only signs of Easter you'll find outside of church. Unlike its Christmas counterpart, Easter is mostly uncommercialized, which is pretty remarkable: the day that we celebrate the glory of Christ's resurrection remains untainted by retailers.

However, just because we're not receiving Easter ad upon Easter ad in our newspapers and inboxes doesn't mean we should pigeonhole the holiday as a minor celebration. Easter is perhaps the most crucial holiday on the Christian calendar—even the word crucial has its roots in Christianity, stemming from the term for crucify.

And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts, and the angels waited on him. Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the Good News of God, and saying, *"The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the Good News."*–Mark 1:12-15

#### In the Spotlight



#### WHAT'S COOKIN'?

With St. Patrick's Day and Spring at the forecast this month, I have a few recipe's that you may enjoy. All recipe's are from www.irishamericanmom.com.

4 cups Cake Flour	3 tsp. Baking Powder	1/2 tsp. Salt	4 oz. Butter
1/2 cup Sugar	1 1/ cups Blueberries	2 large Eggs	3/4 cup Whole Milk
2 Tbsp. Sugar to spri	nkle on top of unbaked scones		



Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Sift flour and baking powder into a large mixing bowl. Cut the butter into one inch pieces, then rub into the flour using a pastry blender, or rub the butter and flour using your fingers, until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add the sugar and mix. Add the blueberries and mix gently to disperse them throughout the flour mixture. In a separate bowl or pitcher, whisk the eggs and milk together. Make a well in the middle of the dry ingredients and pour in most of the liquid. Reserve 1/4 cup of the liquid mixture to brush on top of the unbaked scones. Mix the wet and dry ingredients together using a large spoon or your hands. Form a soft, but not too sticky, dough. Add some extra flour if the dough is sticking to the sides of the bowl. If the dough is too dry and not sticking together, add a little more of the egg and milk mixture. Handle the dough gently to avoid bursting the blueberries. Turn the dough out on to a lightly floured surface. Sprinkle with a little more flour. Knead dough lightly. Flatten the dough into a large round shape, about an inch and a half high. This can be done with your hands or by lightly rolling the dough with a rolling pin. Use a biscuit cutter to cut out round shapes. Place the scones on a greased baking tray. Brush the tops with the reserved egg and milk mixture. Then sprinkle with a little sugar. Bake in oven for 10 minutes. Then reduce the heat to 400 and bake for another 15–20 minutes, Remove from the oven when the topes are turning a lovely golden color. Cool of a wire rack for 10 minutes. To serve, cut in two and spread each side with butter, jam or jelly.

Heat the oil and butter in a large saucepan or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add the leeks, cauliflower and garlic. Cover the pot to sweat the vegetables. Cook for about 10 minutes. Shake the pot every 2 minutes to prevent sticking. Add the stock and increase the heat to bring to boiling point. Reduce the heat, cover the soup pot and simmer for about 40 minutes. Remove from heat and season to taste with salt and pepper. Allow to cool slightly then blitz with an immersion blender until smooth. Stir in cream. Serve warm, garnished with parsley

In a large skillet over medium heat, melt butter. Add onion and cook until softened, about 4-5 minutes. Add the remaining ingredients (except eggs) to the skillet. (Left over Carrots, Potato, Corned Beef Brisket and Cabbage) Cook, stirring often until heated through. Create 6 pockets in the hash and crack one egg into each hole. Cover the skillet and reduce heat to medium. Cook until the eggs reach your desires doneness. Season with salt and pepper prior to serving.

1 tsp. Chocolate Syrup 1 tsp. Vanilla Extract

2 cups Heavy Whipping Cream 1 cup Sweetened Condensed Milk 1 Tbsp. Instant Coffee (dissolved on 1 Tbsp. Water) 1 2/3 cups Irish Whiskey

HINK Recipes Add the heavy whipping cream, sweetened condensed milk, dissolved coffee, chocolate syrup and vanilla extract to a large mixing bowl. Mix together using a balloon whisk until thoroughly combined. Alternatively, you can use an electric mixer, but set at the lowest speed to avoid over thickening the cream. Gradually add in the whiskey, whisking or mixing at low speed until fully combined. Store in sterilized glass bottles with tight fitting lids. Store in the refrigerator for 2-3 weeks. Serve chilled over ice.

4 Ripe Kiwi

15 oz. Mandarin Oranges in light syrup 12 Meringue Cookies



1 1/2 cups Heavy Whipping Cream 2 Tbsp. Confectioners Sugar 2 tsp. Caster Sugar (optional) Peel and dice kiwi fruit, If the kiwi is tart, mix with 2-3 tsp sugar to sweeten. Drain the can of mandarin oranges and

discard the liquid. Crumble the meringue cookies into small pieces. Whip the cream and confectioners sugar. Mix the cookie pieces and whipped cream together. Fill a parfait or wine glass one third with kiwi pieces. Add a layer of creamy meringue mess, then top with a layer of mandarin oranges. Refrigerate for at least 15 minutes before serving. Yields 3-4 servings.

Please let the office know of your interest, as we have open Sundays in June, September and December. Do you have a specific Sunday that you'd like to honor? We are happy to help you with that as well.






